






# Our Work: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow

# **Hope in Action: Our Four Pillars of Work**

# **Programs & Initiatives**

GLAEF programs and initiatives turn partnerships into pathways, expanding access, sparking curiosity, and ensuring schools are places where every student can learn, belong, and thrive.

### Advancing Digital Equity: From Tech Access to Career Dreams

GLAEF, LACOE, and our partners in the LA Teen Tech Collective are ensuring students can access technology, develop critical skills, and pursue future-ready careers.

#### **Impact This Year:**

- Opened **five Teen Tech Centers** in priority communities, serving **1,300**+ students.
- 1,740 students accessed ARP-funded centers.
- Built **100+ industry partnerships**, offering 90 supplemental programs, tutoring, and counseling for 307 students.
- **69 students** gained real-world experience through internships.
- Began development of a juvenile hall site for justice-involved youth.

### **Expanded Learning, Enrichment, and District Partnerships**

GLAEF and LACOE continue to partner on expanding after-school and summer learning, leading district networks, and launching Stitch, a hub connecting families to enrichment opportunities.

# **Our Four Pillars of Work** (Cont.)

## **Community-Centered Schools and Services**

GLAEF and LACOE strengthen schools as hubs of academic, social, and emotional well-being. We bring partners together and facilitate strategic investments to expand supports like food pantries, counseling, and family engagement while also providing technical support for programmatic needs.

### **Impact This Year:**

- Provided technical assistance to 500+ school sites.
- 23 LACOE Community School sites serve 25,336 students.
- Identified 3 Transformation Zone LEAS (Local Educational Agencies) for targeted support.
- Delivered a supplemental e-learning module for Mandated Supporting, training 1,300+ educators from 44 districts.



## **College Access and Career Pathways**

GLAEF and LACOE continue to expand dual enrollment opportunities so students can earn college credit before high school graduation.

### **Impact This Year:**

- Supported 10 districts and their college partners in the LA College Acceleration Network, serving 11.500+ students.
- Partnered with LACOE to hire 3 Dual Enrollment Coordinators to expand access across LA County.
- Hosted workshops for 50 participants from 22 districts.

### **Student-Centered Teaching and Learning**

GLAEF and LACOE ensure every district has the resources to keep students at the center of instruction, collaborating on research, workforce development, and training and technical assistance aligned with policy and funding. **Impact This Year:** 

- · Launched 2 regional hubs (with 4 districts, 4 colleges, 2 community partners) to prepare early educators for multilingual learners.
- Produced 2 research studies, approved by an Institutional Review Board (IRB), exploring the learning experiences of Multilingual Learners, engaging 200+ educators and administrators.
- Shared research with thousands of educators and advocates across the region.

# **Fundraising**

GLAEF fundraising turns generosity into real opportunities that inspire students and strengthen communities.

### **From Local Pride to Lasting Opportunities**

GLAEF helped the Inglewood Unified School District turn a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity into a fundraising success. The Inglewood High School Marching Band was invited to perform at the National Independence Day Parade in Washington, D.C. We partnered with the district to launch a giving campaign, and the Inglewood Educational Foundation stepped up as our largest donor. Together, we rallied community support to cover travel and lodging for 140 students and chaperones while strengthening the district's ability to fundraise for future opportunities.

### **More Impact This Year:**

- Strengthened the LACOE Signature Fund @GLAEF to secure year-round sponsor partnerships for flagship countywide events.
- Expanded the Eric & Christine Alegria Public Service Scholarship to support LA County students pursuing careers in public service.
- Funded events included an immigrant relations convening for district leaders that advanced equity and collaboration across schools.



# **Capacity Building**

GLAEF supports school communities with the tools, partnerships, and stability to meet today's needs and prepare for tomorrow's opportunities.

### **Strengthening Schools to Better Serve Students**

In 2025, our partnership with Long Beach Unified became a model for formalized fiscal sponsorship, beginning with early education programs and now moving toward managing their entire foundation. This work is about more than operations. It is about building a culture of philanthropy in K–12 education, uncovering new funding sources, and giving districts the capacity to focus on student success.

#### **More Impact This Year:**

- GLAEF continues to help districts develop sustainable funding models by hosting workshops and meetings for district leaders to continue building a culture of philanthropy.
- GLAEF provided LACOE with resources to establish and implement an environmental sustainability action plan and support their Green Schools Initiative. Over 200 LACOE staff members provided input through surveys and focus group discussions.

# **Grantmaking**


Grants are more than financial support; they are investments in stronger programs that keep students learning, growing, and reaching their potential well into the future.

### **Grants that Grow Possibility**

Launched in 2024, the Inglewood Youth Education Fund (IYEF) was created to give local youth lasting opportunities to thrive. In 2025, GLAEF focused on establishing the permanent grantmaking program, including formalizing our grantmaking strategy. Our goal is to use the endowment as a launchpad to leverage and identify other funding opportunities to support Inglewood youth, especially as the school district moves out of state receivership into a new era of sustainability and growth for their students.

### **More Impact This Year:**

- GLAEF received 101 proposals from organizations serving youth in Inglewood in our first open call for proposals.
- An 8-member Advisory Committee engaged to support IYEF.
- Launched a bilingual media campaign to reach thousands of families, including a feature on Telemundo 52.



# When Wildfires Struck, We Responded

Every community faces a moment of heartbreak that changes everything. For GLAEF, that moment came with the Los Angeles wildfires, which swept across the region in January 2025.

GLAEF mobilized immediately by creating the LA County Education Wildfire Recovery Fund. Through this fund, we delivered emergency aid to displaced families and provided technology for students and teachers. We prioritized grants to replace learning materials and restore classrooms in schools that lost campuses or suffered severe damage. We also formed a wildfire recovery consortium with the Pasadena Educational Foundation (PEF) and the LAUSD Education Foundation (LAEF) to align strategies, pool resources, and ensure no community was left behind.

### The Road to Collective Recovery

Our work continues with long-term recovery, including mental health support, summer enrichment to restore normalcy, and connecting youth to workforce pathways to help rebuild their communities. GLAEF remains deeply committed to strengthening school communities and supporting them in pursuing new funding opportunities to advance recovery planning efforts across the region.

- Youth Workforce Pathways: Linking students to skilled trade training so they can be part of rebuilding their neighborhoods.
- Mental Health & SEL Support: Funding counseling and trauma recovery programs.
- Community Enrichment: Supporting programs that give displaced students safe spaces to learn and




# **Hope Across Communities**

Our map provides a snapshot of some of our impacts on communities this year.






# Our Team: Leading Together for Lasting Change


